Councillor's Corner – November 2012

The past 8 weeks, since Serco took over the District Council's refuse collection, have been challenging, frustrating and even distressing for all concerned.

What started out as simple teething problems, escalated over the weeks into a shambolic and chaotic affair. Across all three parishes within my ward complaints poured in relating to scores of missed collections (some up to 5 weeks or more), no assisted collections, new bins and containers not being delivered and refuse wagons causing damage to properties. The knock on effect of this saw the District Council's dedicated 'Waste Helpline' overwhelmed with calls, reports of vermin around uncollected refuse and fly tipping across the District.

Upon taking 30-50 combined emails or telephone calls a day personally from my constituents and seeing the entire system fall into disarray, I decided to call the District Council's Chief Executive to seek a special meeting between Councillor's and representatives of Serco to address the problems.

The Chief Executive heeded this request and on 6th November 2012 a special meeting took place. Councillors held the Serco Management Team to account for their failures and made them aware, in no uncertain terms, of their need to 'get a grip' of the situation.

As a result of the meeting and my recent coverage in the local newspaper, Serco representatives have accepted that there were many problems in my Council Ward that needed to be addressed and offered to work with me to resolve them.

Serco explained that problems have occurred due to the size of their vehicles and the crews' unfamiliarity with the new rounds. Smaller vehicles are now being drafted in to deal with the harder to reach areas and crews have been briefed on which roads and outlying properties they have missed.

On the Friday following the meeting, Serco Contract Manager Jo Mortimer and I took a 5 hour tour around the parishes of Elton, Winster and South Darley visiting the areas where collections were being missed, meeting residents on assisted collections and clearing up any uncollected refuse from outlying areas and properties. I was also given a direct contact with the Serco depot to report complaints and missed collections.

With much of the uncollected waste now removed and crews made aware of the missed areas, the following week resulted in a much improved service – not perfect but better. Any missed collections reported to me have been passed on to Serco direct and 'mop-up' collections have taken place as quickly as possible, even at weekends.

Serco have promised to continue working with me to try and resolve the ongoing problems and things appear to be improving. I am aware that there are still problem areas, but I am working everyday to get these sorted out. If you do still have any concerns at all related to refuse collection, please contact

me on the mobile number below. I know of a number of residents who have been reluctant to call me, but please do not hesitate.

I wish to thank all Parish Councillors and residents who have helped me over recent weeks by keeping me updated on what is happening in their area and informing me of what collections remain outstanding. Your help has been greatly appreciated.

Please bear in mind that refuse collections take place in Elton on Wednesdays. One week your grey bin for general waste is collected and then on the second week you blue lid bin and green bin are collected. Your green bin and blue lid bin are collected by two separate refuse vehicles at different time of the day. Food caddies are collected every Wednesday.

Finally, I kindly ask all residents to put their bins out in a convenient, safe and visible location on collection days and return any bins and containers to your property following collections. Please, where possible, do not leave your bins obstructing the roads or walkways.



'Neighbourly kindness and generosity'

When Elton All Saints was built in 1816, it was a struggle to raise enough money to meet the £1,227 14 shillings and five pence ha'penny costs (which included the demolition of the previous, medieval church). The new church was plain and simple; in the words of one author writing 50 years later, the church 'with its round headed windows was possessed of all the worst characteristics of the time in which it was built'. Major improvements were made in 1869 when the window behind the altar was inserted and the windows on the south side were rebuilt in the Gothic style, with pointed arches. An article in the *Derby Mercury* on May 12th 1869 praised the generosity of the sponsors of the first window to be installed on this side:

Vigorous efforts are being made to improve this church and a noteworthy instance of neighbourly kindness and generosity has been shown by the members of the Reading and Choral Association of Sheen, on the suggestion of Mr John Prince Sheldon, who, as their secretary and in the name of the association, has presented a window of tinted and stained glass, to be placed at the south east end of the church, with a suitable inscription, forming the first of four windows on the same side needing similar improvement. The feeling which prompted this proof of sympathy between one village and another, cannot be too highly appreciated.

Here is the inscription, photographed during the Flower Festival in September 2011. It reads, 'To the honour of God. A gift from Sheen. Easter 1869'.



So why should Sheen be moved to such neighbourly kindness and generosity? It was because John Prince Sheldon had an affinity with Elton. He was born in 1841 at Lowfields Farm, Gratton, the eldest son of George Sheldon and his wife Jane of the notable Prince family of Sheen, Staffordshire. It appears that George and Jane attended Elton church because this is where their children were baptised. J. P. Sheldon became a Professor of Agriculture and wrote several books about dairy farming. He was sent to America in 1871 to bring back first hand information on cheese factories. He also wrote about walking in the Derbyshire and Staffordshire countryside around his home at The Brund near Sheen, his mother's native village. He was a benefactor of Sheen church and was buried in the churchyard there in 1913.

Ramblings

November 2012 – Bamford Edge

I have missed the deadline for my regular contributions to the last couple of issues of the Elton Echo but that is not a sign that I have ceased Rambling and have nothing to say. Far from it. Rather the rambling is the reason I have missed the deadlines, having become so involved in the narrow confines of my selfish wishes and desires that I have not considered that you might like a glimpse of another world, for the sake of comparison and criticism. But how to present such a glimpse and which glimpse anyway, because any report is a mere episode in my existence and even to myself can scarcely convey a full picture. These are the philosophical dilemmas that precede any of these presentations. But enough ramblings - on to the Rambling

The first day of October was a pleasant autumn day, and although the forecast was for sunshine and showers, yet the morning started off calm and sunny. I always feel calm and balanced at the start of the month myself, once I have attended to the small financial practicalities of life on a modest income, In this frame of mind I am able to enjoy my world, my life, call it what you will, - so obviously it will be an ideal occasion for a walk!

So my companion of the heart packed a picnic for the expedition which, due to a relaxed schedule that had delivered us already to lunchtime, we partly ate on arrival at the chosen parking spot.

We were going to visit the delightful Bamford Edge today and you can achieve a flying start [is this cheating ?] by parking on a minor top road high above Bamford village, but below the edge itself. This was the same place where we had last parked in January, when the walk had resulted in some some major personal changes of status, but that's another story.

It's a steep start up the bracken and turf hillside at first, but only short and good for the body, and we were soon up on the edge. Here the views immediately become very extensive both to the West and the North and this is good for the soul ! With the strong breeze behind us generally from the west and the sun shining, the colours over the subtle heather shades of the Derwent moors and Kinder Scout were lovely. Yet it is so difficult to convey the delight in such reward for comparatively so little effort. We could wander along and take it all in at leisure, the piles of gritstone rock quite charming in their proportions in the overall scene. It's at such a juncture that the camera is plied so freely, having realised that the photos form a kind of diary of my walks in themselves. Perusing them later at leisure can immediately take me back to the walk, like examining a favourite picture, and recreating the feelings and atmosphere once again.

We skirted round Jarvis clough, a wild and rocky gash in the moors too rough to experience and although I wanted to visit the Hordren Edge stone circle which wasn't too far away on a remote ledge of moorland, I was overruled and we gave it a miss. I did search for another site however, called Bamford Moor North stone circle that I had read about in a book, [called The Prehistoric Peak] but although I had the GPS grid reference, I wasn't able to locate it. Another day, perhaps. I am fascinated by stone circles and ancient monuments, though I don't know why. It's the equivalent of train spotting really, but don't scoff, because this type of [natural, human] affliction takes various forms, one of which, [unknown to yourself], might be yours !

We were out in the middle of the moor now, with the long escarpment of Stanage Edge towering above us and to return to the car meant a pathless traverse which wasn't too bad as the heather here is well managed, that is to say short, for the grouse shooting. We followed a line of grouse butts until we reached a lonely boundary line perhaps between former Estates, that is marked by a row of fine stone posts, drilled to accept a wire fence threaded through them. This wire has long since disappeared to leave the stones as lonely reminders in the middle of a wild moorland setting of the vanity of all human aspirations for personal acquisition. However, the going over this wind ruffled expanse of dried grass and pretty heather whilst nursing such reflections was easy enough, but unfortunately it began to rain at this point. With no shelter of any kind out here in the open, we were soon wet, at least on the outside, having decided from past bitter experiences of British weather that an expensive jacket and trousers are a treasure to relish on such occasions. Of course we were also heading into the wind too as the curtains of rain swept across the moor. Can I say it was enjoyable in its way, [but why was there not a single other person taking such pleasure ?], knowing that any discomfort could only be short lived. We were only ¾ of a world [I mean mile] from the car, though in another world in our head and imagination .

There is always some little distraction to enliven the purgatory on such occasions however and the form it took now was when the dog disturbed a stoat on the way back down a slippery but pretty path. Being chased at full speed down the path, legs and tail flailing in the desperation of full flight, the stoat managed to shoot down its sanctuary of a hole beneath a clump of heather by the skin of its teeth. It had obviously been intent on reaching here if possible, but it had been a risky gamble in the stoat's world, whilst to us humans it had merely been an interesting spectacle. How callous is that ? The dog could only force her nose so far into the hole beneath an embedded rock so it was amusing to observe her demeanour and indignation at the escape.

As we reached the car, the rain had almost cleared and the sun was coming out again. Why is it necessary to endure such pain in order to savour such pleasure was what I was thinking, probably because my trousers were wet and uncomfortable by now, and how could I savour this delight in that circumstance. We ate the remaining picnic in the car, steaming up the windows in the process, just as a reminder that chaos generally has the last laugh.

But we had the enjoyment !!


