Councillor's Corner

Town Hall update from District Councillor, Matt Buckler – August 2024

I hope that you're all having a great summer!

In the last Echo, I told you about the priorities for the new Council and there's plenty of news on some of that front. In this piece, I'm going to be looking at some recent changes and decisions in housing.

The last Government gave a very hard deadline for the review of Local Plans, which is the end of June 2025. Both DDDC and PDNPA are looking at revising their Local Plans to that timescale and will consulting on them over the next few months.

The new Labour government (and don't forget that Parliament now has four Green MPs in it!) has made building significantly more homes their main priority, which is going to be hard. We're all currently learning about the implications of the new National Planning Policy Framework. It's made our joint work on housing need in the National Park even more important, to help support communities like yours to get the housing that they really want and need.

In addition, as we all know, currently converting houses to holiday lets is an issue locally, which means that there has been a net loss of houses in the National Park in recent years. We've written to Angela Rayner MP, through the CEOs of both DDDC and PDNPA to ask for the Government to continue with plans to bring in a new planning class for holiday lets, which would mean that changing the use from a home to a holiday let would need planning permission, giving communities and parish councils more say in whether it's a good thing.

Local Projects Fund

Each Councillor has £1,000 per year to give out to local community groups and projects. I still have funds in my allocation for the year, so please talk to the Parish Council or give me a call if you want to discuss potential projects. A Tribute to Winifred Woodward and Roger Brooks

I know many were greatly saddened to learn of the deaths earlier this year of two long-standing and productive members of Elton Local History Group, who served on the committee from its beginning. I could always rely on Winifred and Roger for advice, guidance and practical help. They were both involved in the production of ELHG's several publications and the two information boards.

Willis and Winifred came to live at Old Stones, Well Street in 1967 after Willis took up the post of headmaster at Bonsall school. Winifred soon found a teaching position at Birchover school, which she held until the school closed in 1987. Winifred's interest in education led her to research the history of schooling in Elton and to write a 16-page booklet, 'Education in Elton, 1650-1900', published in 2006. At 93 Winifred was Elton's oldest lady yet her mind remained sharp. Only a few days before she died she could still beat me at Scrabble!

It was thanks to Roger Brooks that the information boards were erected next to the memorial seats. He was also our IT expert who maintained the ELHG website, a private site for members including family history correspondents from far and wide. At monthly meetings in the village hall Roger regularly entertained us with talks illustrated with his fine photographs, often introducing us to the history of neighbouring areas.

On summer evenings Roger would lead walks to explore the local area including a notable visit to Alport with whose history he was well acquainted. This sparked an interest in the connection between Alport and the hamlet of Dudwood in Elton parish (see Echoes of Elton p76-78). With Roger's guidance to the geography of Alport I researched the documented history of a fulling mill there, where in the 16th and 17th centuries the weavers of Dudwood would take their cloth for finishing. In fact, not only is there the Dudwood Lane where Roger lived but there's also another, leading out of Alport towards Elton, the route travelled by the Dudwood weavers.

The fulling mill was not on the site of the present Alport mill but was near to the ancient house by the river known as Monks Hall. Evidence from documents in the Derbyshire Record Office shows that the mill, then a corn mill, belonged to the monks of Darley Abbey from the 12th century until the dissolution of the monasteries in the 16th century. It was then bought by the Roberts family of Alport and became a fulling mill and subsequently a paper mill. Roger's interpretation of maps and his fieldwork were invaluable to the writing up of this project for the Derbyshire Archaeological Journal in 2017 (available online). This is not the only article in the DAJ that mentions Roger's contribution to local history. While exploring Dobb Edge

above Chatsworth Park he discovered an important and previously unrecorded example of prehistoric rock art and reported it to John Barnatt of the Peak Park Cultural Heritage Team who wrote a description of it in the DAJ in 2014. With modesty typical of Roger he allowed himself to be acknowledged by only his first name.

I very much appreciate the commitment Winifred and Roger made to Elton Local History Group.

An introduction from our new PCSO - Patricia Thompson

I have been a PCSO for almost a year now. I have previous experience working in schools, social care, and local authorities, however I always wanted to be part of policing and assumed I had left it a little too late.

Since joining the Police, I settled quickly into my role and enveloped myself quickly into my beat area which initially was Matlock / Tansley. I have been at Darley/Winster around a month now and been very busy. so far I have issued 17 anti-social behaviour letters, one Community Protection Notice Warning and one Voluntary Control Order.

Police Community Support Officer's are the point of contact and are the face of the force when it comes to public interaction. PCSO's have taken over the role of booby on the beat and are also the primary intelligence gatherers for the Police. We also prioritise community events, visit schools, give informative presentations, and conduct house to house visits after burglaries.

The challenging part of the role is lack of respect and unrealistic expectations from a very slim minority of the public. Some people see us as nothing but a uniform, and don't see that underneath we are human, and we will do everything in our power to help people.

I love the fact that every day is different to the last, and that you can never fully plan what will happen throughout your day! Knowing that what I'm doing is having a positive influence on the community and being able to go home proud of the job that I do.

Report incidents to us. I have had so many instances of people coming up and asking about issues that they have experienced, but not reported to us through the correct lines. It can be anything from anti-social behaviour in the street, to someone trying to attack someone in the street. We can't act on things we don't know, so please report incidents to 101 if it's not an emergency, or 999 if it is an immediate emergency. The most common thing we are asked ranges between "How long can I park here?" "What can you (PCSO's) actually do?"

Foot patrol and interacting with members of the public takes up most of my day. Sometimes we could be at a job all day, but I would say the majority of my time is spent walking around hotspot areas, speaking with members of the public and school engagements.

THEIR FINEST HOUR

With Elton Cricket Club now defunct it seems rather sad to reflect that it is only 15 years since what was surely the high point of the club's long history. July 2009 - on a beautiful evening in Bakewell Elton finally got their hands on the much coveted Orme Shield. Very much the underdogs against a powerful Matlock side, Elton somehow defied the odds to win the Orme Shield final. With what seemed like half of Elton there to cheer them on, it turned into one of the most memorable and exciting evenings of recent times for the village. Looking back now I think the most satisfying thing about that game was that the Elton team was almost entirely home produced. No imported 'star' players - as was the way with most of the other local clubs. Just a proper Elton team. How proud of that we were at the time.

The full match report, as it appeared in the *Matlock Mercury* the following weekend, is reproduced below:

ORME SHIELD FINAL (played at Bakewell)

Elton 117 for 7 (15 overs) beat Matlock 98 for 8 (15 overs) by 19 runs

At first glance, the villagers of Elton seeing off a powerful Matlock side in the Orme Shield final looks very much like a giant killing feat. But this is 15 overs per side cricket - a format the Elton have consistently excelled at over the course of the past two seasons. So much so that they have now developed an inner-belief that, providing they play to their full capability, they can be a match for anyone locally in this form of the game. And so it proved here.

When the final got underway, Elton were invited to bat first and their innings got off to a steady if tense start against the Matlock opening salvo by Ed Lander and Gareth Johnson. However, the early introduction of the wily Steve Haslam produced immediate dividends for Matlock when Craig Elliott (7) edged to the wicketkeeper and the dangerous Rob Lightfoot (10) was caught on the boundary off the same bowler.

Jack Stone had top scored for Elton in each of the previous Orme Shield rounds this year and he repeated that happy knack here, although he would have been disappointed to get out for 24 just as he seemed to be getting properly established - Luke Pressland (4 for 23) rattling his leg stump early on in his impressive spell.

With Elton at 66 for 4, the game was evenly poised but an entertaining stand between the pugnacious John Ashworth (21) and the stylish left hander James Marsden (19 not out) was instrumental in pushing the final Elton total to 117 for 7 at the conclusion of their 15 eight ball overs - a competitive total but not an unbeatable one.

The early stages of the Matlock reply suggested that the County League side would romp home with some comfort as a flurry of firm strokes by Mark Leatherday (19) and Mark Burton (13) crossed the boundary ropes. However, once Leatherday had been rather needlessly run out the Elton bowlers were able to exert a greater degree of control and, in the process, ramp up the pressure on the Matlock batsmen.

Meanwhile, never one to be boxed in, the talented Andy Rogers was prepared to chance his arm in the Matlock cause. A miscued skier by him just evaded Rob Lightfoot's grasp as the fielder ran backwards in the deep. Rogers then survived a confident shout for a stumping before pushing his luck just a little too far when hitting across the line against the persevering Paul Carson and he departed leg before for an eventful 17.

Backed up by some typically sharp Elton fielding and aided by another run out, Carson (1 for 21) and Rob Lightfoot (3 for 15) then turned the screw as Matlock fell behind the rate required and the game swung decisively in Elton's favour.

Elton wicketkeeper Jack Stone was again in fine form, standing up to all of the Elton bowlers and picking up two more stumpings in the process - one routine, one a dazzling leg side effort - to add to his already impressive tally for the season.

In the end Elton were decisive winners by 19 runs - a fine effort against a team liberally sprinkled with players who show off their skills in the upper reaches of the Derbyshire County League. Of the eleven Elton players on view in this match, nine live in the village and the two others hail from within a couple of miles of it. This is a village side in the true sense of the word and the standard they have achieved is all the more remarkable for that.

So, barely a week after getting his hands on the Longstone League trophy, Elton skipper Paul Carson was duly presented with the Orme Shield for the first time in the club's long history. There have been some wonderful performances by this young team over the past two seasons but, given the importance of the occasion and the quality of the opposition here, this was undoubtedly Elton cricket's finest hour.

THE BLACK DOG FILM AND COUNTRY MATTERS SERIES **FURTHER FILM SHOWINGS**

The Black Dog film on my 50 year old VHS cassette which had been copied from a TV broadcast was, understandably, not high quality. I therefore bought a commercial set of the whole Country Matters series of 13 films which had been republished in 2022. This came with lots of publisher's information, some of which is in italics in the comments below. It seems that our local children and farmers and cattle featured in a film which was one part of a '**Very Significant Series**'. Who knew? Certainly not I !

*Adapted from tales by A.E. Coppard and H.E. Bates – two of the great masters of the short story – and produced for Granada TV by Derek Granger, **Country Matters** unarguably remains a high point for television drama, winning the award for **Best Drama at the 1973 BAFTAs**.*

*An anthology series of plays about English country life and rural romance at the turn of the twentieth century, it presents unsentimental stories of human relationships and raw emotions – heartfelt passions, crippling frustrations, unspoken love, and destructive jealousy all feature unsparingly in one of the 1970s' most memorable drama series. **Country Matters** includes memorable performances from Ian McKellan, Rosalind Ayres, Peter Firth, Penelope Wilton, Pauline Collins, Gareth Thomas, Bryan Marshall, Barbara Ewing, Prunella Scales, Zena Walker, Michael Kitchen, and Jeremy Brett, among others. (So many household names!)*

The set includes a book of very informative and comprehensive Programme Notes by Barry Forshaw. Reading those notes beforehand would be a real enhancement to viewing of any of the films. The films are summarised as follows:

- **Craven Arms.** A philandering art teacher is surprised by the sudden advances of a quiet, puritanical girl who is one of his pupils.

- **The Mill.** Alice starts her new job working for Mr. Holland's bedridden wife, but she cannot foresee the explosion of emotions that is to come.
- **The Sullen Sisters.** An amorous 19 year old finds his plans of marriage thwarted by his possessive, widowed mother.
- **Crippled Bloom.** Three people are trapped in a bitter love triangle – and one of them must ultimately lose out.
- **The Watercress Girl.** A young woman stands in the dock, accused of throwing vitriol in the face of her love rival.
- **Breeze Anstey.** A deep friendship between two young women is threatened when one's fiancé suddenly returns from India.
- **The Little Farm.** A quiet girl answers a newspaper advert to look after a lonely, illiterate young farmer.
- **The Black Dog.** A young gentleman's love-at-first-sight encounter leads him into a darker world than he could have expected.
- **The Higgler.** A war veteran must choose between marrying into money or standing by his village sweetheart.
- **The Simple Life.** A bitter, middle-aged spinster has pause for thought when a local boy comes to help about the house.
- **An Aspidistra in Babylon.** A shy 17-year old girl suddenly finds herself transformed into the passionate mistress of a middle-aged army captain.
- **The Ring of Truth.** Can a friendly barmaid help a young man discover the secret behind his father's death?
- **The Four Beauties.** A junior reporter in a small country town has a remarkable encounter with Mrs Davenport and her extraordinary daughters.

Wow! All very strong stuff all set within wonderfully filmed period pieces. (Film classification Age 15.) O Level English Literature and History at Queen Elizabeth's Grammar School, Ashbourne in the 1960s were never this exciting ...

The 2022 reissue of the series has copyright restrictions. I therefore wrote to viewerservices@itv.com giving the background and including:

“Because of the local connection, I would like to ask for permission to show a film or films from the series in our village hall on a no cost non commercial basis for a purely local audience.”

I received a very prompt reply (clipsales@itv.com 12 Mar 24 @ 11:04) :

“Hi Jonathan, Thanks for your email.

As you already have access to the footage (and don't require ITV to supply any material to you), and providing this remains a non-commercial, closed screening with no entry fees, and to a closed/limited audience, then I'm happy to allow this to go ahead. If there are any charges for the screening, or anything else changes, please let us know, but based on this information you've given this seems fine.

Hope all goes well with the screening. Many thanks, Sophia”




